LEGAL UPDATES

IPD Biannual Meetings

1. Updates On Issues Raised By Members At Previous Meetings

a) Possibility Of Linking Status Check Page To Search Site

At previous bi-annual meetings, members enquired whether the IPD could provide a link to a glossary of status descriptions for trade marks on the register on the Registry's search facility. The IPD had considered members' requests and have now provided a link to "Status Description" displayed at the left-hand column in the screen of the Registry's search facility.

b) Transliteration and Translation of Non-Roman and Non-Chinese Characters

At the previous meeting, the IPD was requested to clarify the examination standards with regards to marks containing words/characters not in Roman letters or Chinese characters. The IPD responded that transliterations / translations provided by applicants for marks containing words/characters not in Roman letters or Chinese characters, word marks in different language are



unlikely to be regarded as similar. In the IPD's post meeting notes, the IPD further clarified that although the transliterations and translations of the foreign characters forming the marks are not entered in the Register, such transliterations and translations will be used by the Examiner in considering whether to raise absolute grounds objections against a mark of foreign language for which the meaning may not be easily checked.

c) Clarification of Opposition Deadline in a Short Month

In response to a query from members, the IPD clarified that the opposition deadline for an application published on 30 November should be 29 February in leap years, and 28 February in common years. Since the last meeting, the IPD is considering providing examples in the Trade Marks Registry Work Manual Chapters on "Opposition" and "Computation of time for filing at the Registry".

2. Bi-Annual Meeting on 31 October 2013

The last Bi-Annual meeting with the IPD took place on 31 October 2013. A summary of the issues raised at the meeting is as follows:-

A. Summary of Statistics of the Registries

The IPD announced the statistics regarding applications of trade marks, patents and designs based on the average month-on-month comparison for the period from October 2012 to September 2013. There was an increase by 1.28% in the number of T2 applications received by the Registry during this period.

There was also an increase in the number of standard patent 'request to record' applications by 0.17%. However, for short-term patent applications, there was a decrease by 0.20% in the number of applications received.

For design applications, there was an increase by 1.99% in the number of designs applied for registration.

B. Issues Raised By Members

a) Roman Numerals

Clarification is sought on whether Roman numerals, such as "I" (one), "V" (five), "X" (ten) and "L" (fifty) will be treated as numbers or as letters if they are incorporated in a trade mark for which application is sought. In response, the IPD confirmed that it will consider the mark as a whole and cannot say whether, in general, numerals will be interpreted as a letter or a numeral. It will depend



on context and on whether the public perceives the mark as a numeral.

b) Rules on Preparation for Bundles for Inter-Parte Hearings

Clarification is sought on the rules on preparing evidence bundles at inter-parte hearings. Particularly, in the absence of provision / guidance in the Trade Marks Registry Manual, whether we may refer to the rules applicable to High Court for reference. In response, the IPD clarified that it generally follows the Rules of the High Court. Whilst the Trade Marks Work Manual states that hearing bundles needs to be paginated, the IPD notes that various practice directions are difficult to enforce, particularly where a party is not represented.

c) Timely Issue of Letters Confirming Filing Date

Certain members raised the issue of delays in receiving confirmation of filing dates from the Registry. In an example, three applications for three different marks in the name of the same applicant were filed on the same day. Two have been published for opposition, however, in relation to the third, an official letter has yet to be received confirming the filing date. Whilst the oversight and inconsistency may be inadvertent, we stressed the importance of having a confirmed filing date issued as early as possible. The IPD replied that it is actively trying to clear the backlog and reduce delays. New examiners have been recruited and they are undergoing training. Hence, it may be some time till the backlog is cleared.

d) Post-Grant Amendment of a Hong Kong Standard Patent Registered on the Basis of a European Patent

Under s. 43(1) of the Hong Kong Patents Ordinance:

If the specification of the corresponding designated patent in respect of a standard patent granted ... has ... been amended in the designated patent office following prescribed opposition or revocation proceedings, the proprietor of the standard patent shall file with the Registrar ... within the prescribed period a verified copy of the amended specification or the amending order or other prescribed documents.

Under s. 36 of the Patents (General) Rules under the Patents Ordinance:

The following opposition or revocation proceedings are prescribed for the purposes of sections 43 ... of the Ordinance –

. . .

(b) in European Patent Office, any post-grant opposition proceedings under or in accordance with Part V of the European Patent Convention.



The European Patent Convention has recently been revised, allowing a proprietor of a European patent to limit (under Articles 105a to 105c) a granted European patent by an amendment of the claims, which, if allowed, will be effective in all the Contracting States in which it has been validated.

However, as limitation is not an opposition or revocation proceedings prescribed under s. 36 of the Patents (General) Rules, the Registrar of Patents has refused to amend a Hong Kong standard patent registered on the basis of a European patent which has subsequently been limited. This means that the proprietor of a Hong Kong patent has to consider petitioning to the Court for a post grant limitation of the Hong Kong patent, which is significantly more expensive than a simple amendment application before the Registrar. The IPD replied that it will consider this matter further.

e) Other Matters

- i. The IPD informed us that its IT infrastructure is currently being replaced and therefore the frequency at which the IPD's website is not available will increase. The process will last until next year. There will however be no difference to the public interface after the new infrastructure is in place.
- ii. The current waiting time for inter parties substantive hearings is 20-22 months.
- iii. The IPD is conducting an internal costing exercise and will review the official fees for trade marks, patents and designs. There may be a revision of the official fees upwards or downwards depending on the outcome of the costing exercise. The revision is scheduled to take place in the second half of 2014.
- iv. The IPD is considering the implementation of the Madrid Protocol and Hague Agreement Concerning the International Registration of Industrial Designs to Hong Kong.
- v. The IPD is also considering requiring the stating of a company's description on Form T2 where applicant is a company. This is so that the owner of a trade mark can be easily identified with information such as the type of incorporation and place of incorporation recorded on the register.
